Carnegie Science Center's SkyWatch begins with a virtual tour of the night sky in the Henry Buhl, Jr. Planetarium Buhl Planetarium. Afterward, visitors are welcome to enjoy additional planetarium programs and, if the skies are clear, head up to the Science Center's rooftop observatory to get up-close and personal with amazing celestial objects! The science center's 16-inch Meade LX200 Schmidt-Cassegrain telescope is powerful enough for guests to spot Saturn's rings and to see details on the lunar surface. Visitors will also have the opportunity to chat with the Science Center's team of expert stargazers.

SkyWatch is presented twice: once at 7 pm and again at 9 pm. SkyWatch happens rain or shine. The cost is \$4 for non-members and \$2 for museum members, or as an add on to general Science Center admission or an Omnimax movie.

Astronomy buffs who bring their own fully assembled telescopes to share with others attend SkyWatch for free.
